This work will be to locate and verify underground utilities, as well as access manholes in preparation for upcoming rehabilitation work. Think of it as us doing our homework before the real construction begins. Preparation work now ensures future work is done safely and efficiently.

Cypress Trunk Sewer Project

The Project

The Cypress Trunk Sewer Project is enhancing 7 miles of sewer through various streets in the cities of Cypress, La Palma and Los Alamitos. A mile of pipe will be replaced with a larger diameter pipe to increase the capacity, approximately 5.5 miles of pipe will be cleaned and injected with chemical grout to lengthen its service life, and approximately 100 manholes will also be replaced and/or rehabilitated.

The Need

The Cypress Trunk Sewer Project will ensure the continued reliability of the regional sewer system. The regional sewer line in the cities of Cypress, Los Alamitos, and La Palma is approximately 50 years old and in need of upgrades. These repairs will increase sewer capacity and allow for more efficient and reliable management while extending the life of the sewer pipes by another 50 years.



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The Orange County Sanitation District (OC San) is a public agency that provides regional wastewater collection, treatment, and recycling services for approximately 2.6 million people in central and northwest Orange County. OC San operates two facilities, 15 pump stations, almost 400 miles of regional sewer pipes, and treats around 190 million gallons of wastewater each day.
